<u>The only reason they brought Benjamin with</u> <u>them was that he (the viceroy), demanded this</u> <u>on their previous trip to Egypt. He explained</u> <u>further that their father would surely die of</u> <u>worry over Benjamin if he did not return with</u> <u>them. Judah then asked if he could stay in the</u> <u>place of his brother Benjamin</u>

They were to life in Goshen.

5. How long did it take to embalm Jacob's body?

It took the doctors forty days to embalm Jacob.

4. How did the Lord appear to Moses on mount Horeb in Midian when He wanted to call Moses for a very important mission?

<u>He appeared to Moses as an Angel of God</u> <u>in a burning bush.</u>

5. While Moses watched the burning bush, he noticed that the thorn bush did not burn out. He went closer. What did God then told him and what command did He gave to Moses?

<u>God told him to take his shoes of, for</u> <u>the ground he was standing on was holy</u> <u>ground. He then introduced Himself to</u> <u>Moses and instructed him to lead the</u> <u>Israelites from Egypt.</u>

Moses explained to Pharaoh that it would not be right to do so; for the manner

in which the Israelites wished to sacrifice to the Lord their God; would be an abomination in the eyes of the Egyptians and they would want to stone the Israelites over it.

The tenth plague was the death of the firstborns.

2. The servant wanted to make sure that he chose the correct wife for Isaac. He prayed to God for assistance, and he asked God that the correct woman would give him a certain answer when he asked for water, and in this way he will know whom to choose for Isaac. What was the answer she was supposed to give Eliezer?

Drink and I will let your camels drink also.

3. How old was Abraham when he died and where was he buried?

4. What did Rebekah consult the Lord about when she was pregnant, and what was the Lord's answer?

<u>God told her that she would become the mother of two sons. Both the boys'</u> <u>descendants would become large nations, but one would be stronger than the other</u> <u>would; and the older brother would serve the younger brother. It was a strange</u> <u>statement but she remembered it.</u>

1. To which person's authority should you submit daily and why?

You must submit to all authority appointed over and above you. This includes parents, teachers, ministers, church councils, employers, police, traffic officers, civil servants and government leaders. God demands that we obey the state and other authority, because governments in principle derive their authority from God. How do we know this? Because there is no other power in the universe except that of God and therefore no power may be practiced if it is not in God's will. State authority, therefore, comes from God Himself.

2. If a person appointed over you is an unbeliever, do you still need to listen to him?

Yes you should still listen to him, because Romans 13: 1-7 was not written just for the believers in Rome, but for all people of all times and circumstances, including us living now. Note that the believers in Rome lived under great persecution. Christians were thrown to wild animals, burned and tortured. They weren't sure of their lives at that time. It is written in Romans 13:1-2: Let every man submit to the powers that has been set over him, for there is no power except from God and those who are there are ordained by God so that he who moves against the power resists the institution of God; and those who resist it will receive their judgment. Nevertheless, the Lord God has never commanded anyone to obey human laws in disregard of His heavenly law. When a vain king, Nebuchadnezzar, erected a golden statue in the square and ordered everyone to kneel down before it and worship it, three Hebrew men risked their lives, by not doing so. They thereby remained faithful to God (Daniel 3).

- **Study:** Genesis 41: 16 So Joseph answered Pharaoh, saying, "It is not in me; God will give Pharaoh an answer of peace."
- **Sing:** Psalm 104: 20, 21

Answer the following questions:

1. Why did Joseph send the caretaker after his brothers?

Joseph wanted his caretaker to accuse his brothers of stealing his drinking cup. He wanted to know if they had changed for the better. Years before they sold him as a slave and he wanted to see if they would let Benjamin down as well, just as they did him at that time.

2. What did the brothers say could happen to the one with whom the viceroy's silver cup is found?

They said that the one with whom the cup was found had to be killed.

3. Why did God send Joseph to Egypt?

<u>God sent Joseph to Egypt to save lives during that awful drought. His job was to</u> <u>store food for the seven years of drought.</u>

4. Why did all the brothers get only one set of clothing but Benjamin received five sets?

Benjamin got more clothes, because he and Joseph were full brothers, they had the same mother (Rachel) and father (Jacob). The other brothers were half brothers, although they all had the same father (Jacob), they had different mothers (Leah, Silpa and Bilhah

5. Where did Pharaoh say could Joseph's family live in Egypt?

<u>Pharaoh said that they could go and live in the land of Goshen. because they were livestock farmers.</u>

Read Romans 13: 1-7 and 1 Timothy 2:2 then discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Is it necessary to pray for the government (authorities), if their authority then comes from God? (Motivate your answer)

Yes, we need to pray for the authorities so that we can live a peaceful and quiet life with complete devotion to God (with godliness); and in all respectability and dignity.

2. Do the authorities have the authority to apply the death penalty, if a person is guilty of murder?

Yes, the government have the authority to apply the death penalty. The government received its authority from God and its authority to use the power of the sword and thus to impose the death penalty. The authorities do not carry the sword for nothing. The duty of the government and authorities are to punish those that does evil and do not abide by the laws. If the authorities don't punish the guilty, the authority's responsibility as servant of God is compromised.

Answer the following questions:



1. What did a new Pharaoh do to the Israelites hundreds of years later? (He was scared because there were too much Israelites)

<u>The new Pharaoh forced them into hard labour. They were obliged to make bricks</u> <u>and to build for him two new supply cities, Pithom and Raamses. Pharaoh hoped</u> <u>that many of the Israelites would die, because of the hard work.</u>

2. Pharaoh's oppression did not help. Even under the tribulation, the number of Israelites kept increasing. What was his second plan to make them less and did it work?

<u>Pharaoh commanded the midwives Shiphrah and Puah to kill every newborn</u> <u>Israelite boy. No, his second plan didn't work either, because the midwives were</u> <u>believers and they were more afraid of God than of Pharaoh. They therefore did not</u> <u>comply with the order the Pharaoh gave them.</u>

- 3. At the burning bush, God gave Moses the command to deliver Israel. What three signs did Moses have to do, if the people would not listen to him?
 - a. <u>Moses had to throw his staff (cane) on the ground and it would turn into a snake.</u> <u>When he grabbed the snake by its tail, it would turn back into a staff (cane).</u>
 - b. <u>Moses had to put his hand into his bosom (folds of his clothes) and his hand</u> would be leprous when he took it from his bosom. Then he had to put this leprous hand back into his bosom where after it would be healthy.
 - c. If the Israelites did not want to believe those two signs, he had to take water from the Nile and throw it out on the ground. That water would then instantly turn into blood.

Read Romans 3: 9-20; 1 Corinthians 12: 1-11; 2 Corinthians 3: 5-6 then discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Are we naturally qualified to work in God's kingdom?

<u>No, we are not, for we are all under the power of sin. We are not fair and we do not have a natural desire to seek and serve God. It is only by the intervention of the Holy Spirit that we become qualified to work in God's kingdom.</u>

2. Does the Lord, through the Holy Spirit, give everyone the same gifts/talents? Discuss.

<u>No, each of us possesses different gifts of grace, according to the grace</u> we received. The Holy Spirit gives one person the gift of speaking words of wisdom, to another words of knowledge or faith or healing or prophecy or to discern spirits, or to speak in different languages, or the gift of interpretation of languages.

7. The ten plagues and the institution of the Passover

Answer the following questions:

1. How old were Moses and Aaron when the Lord gave them the command to talk to Pharaoh?

Moses was 80 years old at the time and Aaron 83.

2. Aaron threw his staff to the ground and it became a snake. The wizards of Egypt also threw their rods to the ground, and their rods also became snakes but then what did Aaron's serpent do to their serpents?

Aaron's snake swallowed the wizards' snakes.

3. Why did the Lord harden Pharaoh's heart?

<u>The Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart so he could see that he was powerless toward</u> <u>the God of Israel. He bowed before the God of Israel only after ten plagues.</u>

4. With the fifth plague, there was pestilence among the livestock. Did everyone in Egypt's animals die?

No, only the livestock of the Egyptians died, but the Israelites' livestock did not die.

5. What were the Israelites obliged to do so that their firstborns did not die?

<u>The Israelites had to smear the blood of a year-old lamb (without blemishes) on the</u> <u>doorposts of every house where they would eat the lamb.</u>

Read Romans 9: 17-18; Exodus 7: 1-5; Exodus 12: 12 and Jeremiah 18: 1-7 then discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Can the Lord use disbelievers to show his omnipotence? Give an example.

Yes, the Lord can use disbelievers to show his omnipotence. For example, God used the Pharaoh with his hardened heart to display His holy power, vigour and authority over Egypt by means of the plagues and wonders. He also cast judgment on all the Egyptian gods.

2. What does it mean when a person hardens his heart against God?

This means that a person's heart became hardened, because he or she has been seduced by sin and sin makes one's heart hard and one's ear deaf to the voice of the Holy Spirit. Most people don't want to admit and confess their sin. A pattern of disobedience forms, and then people fall away from God, they rebel against Him and harden their hearts.

3. True or false?

God is the Potter and we are the clay. He desires a soft heart so that He (the Potter) can work with us (the clay), to shape and form us as He wants us. <u>True</u>



When I love God with my entire heart, soul and mind I would study the Word of God with precision, and eagerly voice the good news about the Kingdom of Heaven (Matthew 24: 13-14). I would not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God. Serve God with Spiritual gifts. (Romans 12: 1-2) For complete love of God would draw me near to God and He will draw me near to me (James 4:8).

1. Why is it important for parents to discipline their children?

Discipline teach and show children what the right thing to do is. When we are chastised, at that moment the chastisement does not look like something to be happy about, but to cry over. Later, however, it produces good fruit for those who have been shaped by it: peace because they obey the will of God. (Hebrews 12: 11). God's discipline is loving, and so should it be with parents towards their children. Physical discipline may never cause lasting pain or emotion. Discipline should be followed by comfort and assurance that the parent still loves the child.

2. Do you think corporal punishment is justified? Motivate from Scripture.

Yes, because in the Proverbs of Solomon there are several passages where physical discipline is recommended. He who holds back his rod hates his son; but he who loves him visits him with chastisement. (Proverbs 13: 24) If foolishness is stuck in the heart of the boy, the rod of discipline will remove it. (Proverbs 22: 15) The rod and the rebuke give wisdom; but a son left to himself puts his mother to shame. (Proverbs 29: 15) The fear of the Lord is the principle of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and discipline. (Proverbs 1: 7) Children who grow up without discipline have no respect for authority: therefore, they will also find it difficult to obey God. God also applies discipline when He corrects us so that we can walk the right path; a path according to His will. Through this we are led to repentance for our sins.

- **Study:** 1 Samuel 3: 10 Now the boy Samuel ministered to the Lord before Eli. And the word of the Lord was rare in those days; there was no widespread revelation.
- Sing: Psalm 47: 4

Saul acted foolishly and did not keep the commandment of the Lord, because he did not wait for Samuel. He became impatient and ordered that the burnt offering and the thank offerings (meal offerings) should be taken to him and he then offered them himself.

5. What did Jonathan do that his father forbade?

Saul forbade his army to eat anything before nightfall. Jonathan did not know about the prohibition (oath) and put out the end of the staff that was in his hand and dipped it in a honeycomb and ate it, and his eyes became clear. (He felt better after eating something.)

6. One of the men then told Jonathan about the oath and the curse and explained to him that this was the reason why the people were tired (exhausted). What did Jonathan then answer?

My father plunges the country into misfortune; see how bright my eyes are now, because I have tasted this little honey. How much more if the people today could eat freely from the spoils of their enemies they have found! But now the slaughter among the Philistines is not great.

Read John 14: 6-11 and discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Can one approach God without Christ? Motivate.

<u>No, because Jesus is the way and the truth and the life; no one comes to the Father</u> <u>except through Jesus.</u>

2. Can deceased saints intercede for us with God?

<u>No, dead saints cannot intercede for us with God. Jesus's words in John 14: 14</u> says If you ask anything in my name, I will do it. We do not need saints to intercede for us - only faith in Jesus Christ.



And finally, you must believe and trust in the Lord Jesus like a child and then you will not only receive Jesus, but also God the Father.

Study: Matthew 18: 8 - If your hand or foot causes you to sin, cut it off and cast it from you. It is better for you to enter into life lame or maimed, rather than having two hands or two feet, to be cast into the everlasting fire.

Any person you cross paths with and to whom you can show kindness, mercy and love.



<u>To speak wisdom; to have knowledge; faith as a gift; to heal; to work miracles; to prophesy; to distinguish between true and false spirits; to speak in foreign languages; and to interpret foreign languages.</u>

3. These different gifts are used by the Spirit to bind the body of God, the church, into unity. Can one then work alone in God's field? Motivate your answer.

No, you do not work alone in God's field. As a member you are part of the body of Christ. Jesus is the head and from Him the whole body grows. The different parts fit together and form a unit together. Each fulfils his or her function (grace or service), and so the body builds itself up in love. (Ephesians 4: 1-16)

1. Why is it important to read the Bible regularly?

It is important to read the Bible, in order to get to know the true character of God. It is dangerous to have a wrong impression of who God is. If you make God the way you want Him to be, it is the same as worshiping an idol, because that is not who God is. It is also important to note that God never changes and neither does our sinful nature! When we read the Bible we realize that nothing that happens is new. (Ecclesiastes 1: 9) The Bible is so important that Jesus said, a person need more than bread to live on. What you really need is to live by every word that comes from God's mouth. (Matthew 4: 4) The Bible also tells us how to get to heaven. (John 14: 6, Ephesians 2: 1-10 and Isaiah 53: 6) The Bible teaches us that God loves us. (Romans 5: 6-8 and John 3: 16) This brings us closer to God and teaches us to love Him too. (1 John 4: 19) The Bible also equips us to serve God in the correct way. (2 Timothy 3:17, Ephesians 6:17 and Hebrews 4:12) God's Word helps us to see the sin in our lives and to break with it. (Psalm 119: 9-11)

2. Do false teachings exist? And how can one notice it?

Yes, there are false teachings. Jesus warned us that false christs and false prophets will come with false teachings to try to deceive even us (God's elect). (Matthew 24: 23-27, 2 Peter 3: 3 and Jude 17-18) The best way to protect yourself from lies and false teachers is to know the truth. Any believer who knows the Bible well, (2 Timothy 2: 15) will immediately reject and recognize false teachings. The Bible is therefore the standard that one must use to determine what is the truth and what is incorrect or erroneous dogma. Dogma is a church doctrine that is no longer subject to reasoning.

The believer (who according to John 5: 24 hears the word and believes Him who sent Jesus) will spend forever with God in his presence and they will have life in abundance. The unbelieving person (who does not believe the word and rejects Jesus Christ) will be separated from God and they will forever endure the terrible sorrows of the lake of fire, because they did not receive the gospel in faith. (Revelation 20:10)

2. Describe eternal life according to John 17:3.

<u>According to John 17: 3 eternal life is that people would know God, the only true</u> <u>God and for Jesus Christ (who was sent by God).</u>

- **Study:** Luke 15: 10 Likewise, I say to you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.
- Sing: Psalm 45: 1

23. Jesus depart to Jerusalem

Answer the following questions:

1. How many lepers did Jesus heal, while He was travelling to Jerusalem? How many of them turned around, glorified God and thanked Him?

Jesus healed ten lepers, but only one turned around, glorified God and fell on his face and thanked Jesus.

2. What does the Lord Jesus say is the only reason why a person may divorce?

The only reason a person may divorce is for adultery or fornication.

3. Who is Jesus talking about when He says that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for such a person to enter the kingdom of God? (Matt. 19:24)

<u>Jesus is talking about a rich man.</u>

4. All the labourers who worked in the vineyard received the same daily wage. So what were they unhappy about?

Although the farmer promised all the labourers the usual daily wage, the first labourers worked hard all day in the hot sun for the farmer. Those first workers therefore expected to be paid more, because they worked longer and harder than the others who only started working much later that day. But this did not happen, the farmer paid everyone the same daily wage and this caused the unhappiness.

5. Why did Jesus heal the two blind men by the side of the road, just outside Jericho?

Jesus healed them, because He deeply pitied them.

Read Romans 12: 1-3 and 1 Corinthians 3: 16-17 and discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. How can you put your body at the service of God?

We must take care of our bodies, keep them clean, pure, fit and healthy, and use them as instruments of righteousness in the service of God. We must not become conformed to the world, not even in dishonourable forms of dress, eating and drinking habits. We must renew our mind (thinking) to find out what God's perfect will is and we must not think more of ourselves than one should think. We should rather be modest.

2. What does it mean to violate your body (a temple of God)?

<u>One can harm one's body through unhealthy and excessive eating habits, the use of drugs, this includes tobacco and alcohol, the application of tattoos, etc. Those people are not examples of holiness, but they undermine their own lives and set a bad example for others.</u>



25. The last conversation with the Jews



Answer the following questions:

1. Some Pharisees and Herodians sent their disciples to Jesus with the question: Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar or not? Jesus did not answer them immediately. What did he request from them and how did he then use it to answer them?

Jesus knew their hypocrisy and requested them to bring him a penny (coin). They gave Him the penny and He then asked them: Whose image (head) and inscription (name) is on the penny? They answered that it was the emperor's image. Then Jesus said to them pay to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's.

2. According to Jesus, what is the great commandment in the law?

<u>That you must love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and</u> with all your mind.

3. And the second commandment?

You must love your neighbour as yourself.

4. Is God then a God of the dead? Motivate.

<u>No, God is not a God of the dead, but of the living. Jesus said that God said the</u> <u>following: I am the God of Abraham and the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.</u>

Read Romans 13: 6-8 and Mark 12: 17 then discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Apostle Paul says "Pay then to all that is due to them: taxes to those who tax...," but you may be wondering, "Do Christians really have to pay all taxes?"

Yes, we must. Think of the admonition that Jesus gave to his disciples. He knew that his Jewish compatriots felt great resentment at the taxes levied by Rome. Nevertheless, Jesus urged them that they should pay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God. (Mark 12:17) Jesus said that people had to pay taxes to the government that would later execute him. Paul also urged people to pay taxes despite the fact that large sums of tax money were used to finance Rome's military force and the immoral and extravagant lifestyle of the emperors.

2. How would a believing government use the taxes they get in?

A believing government will use the tax money correctly and honourably to properly finance and manage government departments, hospitals, schools, the police service and the armed forces. The government will also build roads, schools and hospitals and make services such as electricity, water and sanitation accessible to all. A believing government will not waste or embezzle the tax money, but use it for the good in order to maintain the country and its citizens.

Study: Matthew 22: 37 - Jesus said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind."

Sing: Psalm 125: 4 and 5

26. Conversation about the second coming of Christ



Answer the following questions:

1. What did Jesus say many false prophets will do before his return?

Jesus said that many false prophets will arise and deceive many people, because the injustices will increase (in other words, the contempt for the law of God will increase), and this will cause the love of most people to grow cold.

2. Why did Jesus say the days would be shortened in the last days?

For if those days are not shortened, no flesh will be saved; but for the sake of the elect, time will be shortened.

3. What signs shall we see in the sun, moon, and stars, before the sign of the Son of man would appear in heaven?

We would see the sun darken, the moon lose its brightness and the stars fall from heaven, and all the powers of the heavens would be shaken (disrupted).

4. Can one calculate the date of the second coming of Jesus Christ according to the Bible?

<u>No. because no one knows when that day and hour will come, not even the angels of heaven, only God the Father knows.</u>

Read Matthew 24: 24, Matthew 25: 1-13 and 2 Peter 2: 1-3 the confirm if the following statements are true or false?

- 1. False prophets and false heresies are the greatest threat to the Lord's church, because they can also deceive the elect. <u>*True*</u>
- 2. False teachers are present in the church. They often occupy leadership positions and are pleasant people, good speakers and very friendly. The problem lies in what they say. A false teacher always deviates in some way from what the Bible teaches about Jesus. The false teacher has a different opinion (which supposedly makes more sense) about Jesus's virgin birth, true humanity, sinlessness, true Divinity, salvation, resurrection, ascension or second coming. Therefore, it is not about how well a teacher preaches, but about what he confesses about Jesus.
- 3. In the parable of the wise and foolish girls, five girls made sure they had enough oil and even took extra oil with them to wait for the bridegroom. There were also five other girls who were reckless with the oil. What is interesting is that these five senseless girls were also waiting for the groom. But when the groom stayed away too long, all ten girls fell asleep. Then the groom came unexpectedly in the middle of the night. What a surprise! It wasn't just a story all the time! The foolish girls ran out of oil, and the bridegroom excluded them. Just like this, one day Jesus would suddenly and unexpectedly come back down to earth. Jesus warned his disciples and us in this parable that among us (who attend religious services) there may be people who, like those foolish girls, will be excluded when He comes again. He will have to say to these church people: I don't know you!

<u>True</u>

27. Jesus celebrates Passover

Answer the following questions:



1. Why did Judas Iscariot go to the high priests?

<u>Because Satan went in Judas Iscariot and then Judas went to the high priests and leaders to consult about how he could deliver Jesus to them.</u>

2. Whom did Jesus tell to prepare the Passover?

Jesus ordered Peter and John to prepare the Passover.

3. Jesus said the following: But look, the hand of him who betrays Me is at My table. To whom did the Lord Jesus refer?

<u>Judas Iscariot</u>

4. Should we also wash each other's feet, because Jesus washed the disciples' feet?

No, when we limit Christ's command to a literal washing of feet, then we are demerit Christ's words, because one can wash feet with a loveless heart. Jesus Christ washed his disciples's feet out of love. In John 13 we read that Jesus loved his own people to the end. Even as He faced His death on the cross, Christ taught His disciples about self-sacrificing love.

5. Fill in the missing words with which Jesus introduced the Lord's Supper:

And He took <u>bread</u>, gave <u>thanks</u> and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is My <u>body</u> which is given for you; do this in <u>remembrance</u> of Me." Likewise, He also took the <u>cup</u> after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in My <u>blood</u>, which is <u>shed</u> for you."

Read 1 Corinthians 11: 23-29 and the Heidelberg Catechism The Lord's Day 25 then discuss the following with your parents or guardian:

1. What are sacraments?

Sacraments are visible, holy signs and seals. They were instituted by God so that by our use of them he might make us understand more clearly the promise of the gospel, and seal that promise. And this is God's gospel promise: to grant us forgiveness of sins and eternal life by grace because of Christ's one sacrifice accomplished on the cross.

2. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper has two signs, namely the bread and the wine. What spiritual meaning does the bread that is broken and the cup of wine that is drunk have?

<u>The bread represents Jesus Christ's body that was sacrificed and broken for our</u> <u>sins on the cross. The wine represents his blood that was shed for us during the</u> <u>crucifixion. When we use the Lord's Supper, we proclaim the death of the Lord</u> <u>Jesus until He comes again.</u>

Study: John 14: 2 - In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you.

Sing: Psalm 149: 1

28. The way to the Cross

Answer the following questions:

1. To whom did Jesus say "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful, even to death. Stay here and watch with Me."



Peter and the two sons of Zebedee (James and John).

2. Jesus prayed three times in the garden of Gethsemane, write down the three prayers.

<u>1. O My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will."</u>

2. O My Father, if this cup cannot pass away from Me unless I drink it. Your will be done."

<u>3. So He left them, went away again, and prayed the third time, saying the same words.</u>

3. With what sign did Judas betray Jesus to show the soldiers which man they should capture?

Judas betrayed Jesus with a kiss.

4. Who told the Jews that it was more beneficial for only one man to die for the whole nation?

The high priest Caiaphas

Read Philippians 2: 5-9 and the Heidelberg Catechism The Lord's Day 16 and 17 then discuss the following with your parents or guardians:

1. Why was it necessary for Jesus Christ to be humiliated to the point of death when he came to the world? Why did Christ have to suffer death?

Because of the justice and truth of God, Jesus Christ had to take our sin on his shoulders and bear God's punishment for that sin in our place. He died the real death, which was meant for us. He was humbled that we might be exalted. Because God's justice and truth require it, nothing else could pay for our sins except the death of the Son of God.

2. Do we also have to die and why? If Christ already died for us, why do we still have to die?

Yes, we will die, because we are still living in the world of death. But our death will not be eternal, because it is no longer a payment for our sins. Thus, the debt of our sins is not paid when we die, it only puts an end to our sinning and through death we get entrance into eternal life. (Only those who are alive when Christ comes again will not die.)

3. What does Christ's resurrection mean to you?

Jesus Christ conquered death through his resurrection, so that we can share in the righteousness that he acquired through his death and by Christ's power our old selves are crucified, put to death, and buried with him, so that the evil desires of the flesh may no longer rule us. We are now raised to a new life by his power. Jesus's resurrection is a guarantee for our own blessed resurrection and we can now offer ourselves as a sacrifice of gratitude to him.

Study: Luke 22: 42 - saying, "Father, if it is Your will, take this cup away from Me; nevertheless not My will, but Yours, be done."
