- 2. What did God create on the respective days? (Genesis 1: 1–31)
 - First day: God created light to differ between day and night.
 - Second day: He created the firmament (heavens) and separated the waters below from the firmament (heavens) above.
 - Third day: God assembled the water at specific places (sea) and grass, plants and trees sprouted on the dry land.
 - Fourth day: God created the sun for the day and the moon and stars for the night.
 - Fifth day: God created the living creatures for the sea and birds that flew in the sky above the earth.
 - Sixth day: God created animals, Every human being is special and He also created Adam, in His own image.
- 3. What did God do on the seventh day? (Genesis 2: 1 3)

On the seventh day God rested from all the work He had done.

4. Which task was given to man by God after He had blessed them? (Genesis 1: 28)

He told them to be fertile and to multiply, fill the earth, cultivate the earth and to reign over the fish, birds and animals.

God gave all the plants and fruit from all the trees that gave seed to man as food.



3. What did the snake say would happen to them should they eat from that tree? (Genesis 3: 4-5)


They would surely not die, their eyes would open and they would be like God, knowing good and evil.

3. Why was Cain so upset? (Genesis 4: 5)

Cain was angry because God did not accept his offering while Abel's offering had been accepted.

4. What did Cain then do to his brother Abel? (Genesis 4: 8)

When they were alone in the field Cain slew his brother because he was angry and jealous of Abel.

5. How did God punish Cain? (Genesis 4: 11 - 12)

God cursed Cain from the earth and if he should cultivate the soil, it would produce nothing. He would be a fugitive and a vagabond on earth.

3. What did Noah have to do before God could execute His punishment?


He had to build an Ark of gopher wood according to God's specifications.

3. What sin did Noah commit? (Genesis 9: 21 - 23)


Noah drank wine, got drunk and lay naked in his tent.

God confused their language because they were disobedient to His will. (They refused to spread all over the earth and were arrogant and proud, and they wanted to make a name for themselves.) God forced them, with the language confusion to move away from one another and spread all over the earth. The language confusion caused them not to understand one another, which stopped them from building the city and the tower and caused them to move away from one another.



3. Why did Abram and Lot go to stay apart from each. other? (Genesis 13: 8)



- Abram did not want to quarrel (argue) with his nephew and gave him the choice to choose a piece of land for himself to stay. Abram would then go and stay in the opposite direction.
- 4. Where did Lot go to stay and was it, according to the Bible, a good choice? (Genesis 13: 10 13)

Lot went to stay in the fertile Jordan region towards the evil cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. No, it was not a good choice, because it was too close to the evil city of Sodom.

5. Where did Abram stay? (Genesis 13: 12)

Abram remained in Canaan.

6. What promise did God make to Abram? (Genesis 13: 16)

God promised that He would make Abram's offspring as much as the dust of the earth.

His name means king of righteousness.

4. Which city was Melchizedek king of and what did the name of the city mean? (Genesis 14: 8)

He was king of the city of Salem and the name meant peace.

5. With which words did Melchizedek bless Abram? (Genesis 14: 19 - 20)

He blessed Abram with the following words: 'Blessed be Abram of the most high God, possessor of heaven and earth: and blessed be the most high God, which hath delivered thine enemies into thy hand. And gave him tithes of all"

12. Hagar flees to the wilderness

Answer the following questions:

1. Why did Abram think Eliezer would be his heir?(Genesis 15: 2-3)

Abram thought Eliezer to be his heir, because Abram had no children of his own.

2. Abram asked for a sign from God. What did God instruct Abram to do to establish His covenant with him? (Genesis 15: 9 – 18)

God instructed Abram to take a three year old heifer, a three year old goat ewe and a three year old ram and cut them in half and put the halves on opposite sides of a path in two rows. He also had to put a turtle dove and young pigeon opposite each other. After sunset a smoking oven and fiery torch passed through the pieces of meat.

3. Why did Hagar (Sarai's Egyptian slave) flee? (Genesis 16 : 6)

Hagar ran away because Sarai treated her badly. When Hagar became pregnant she despised Sarai, who was childless and Sarai was the mistress who punished her slave by treating Hagar badly because of Hagar's superior attitude towards Sarai.

4. What promise did God's angel give to Hagar in the desert after she ran away / had fled? (Genesis 16: 7 – 12)

He told her that her descendants would multiply so that they would become innumerable.

5. What was the name Hagar had to give Abram's son? (Genesis 16: 11)

Hagar had to call him Ishmael.

They rebelled against Chedorlaomer and refused to pay tax any further. Chedorlaomer then marched against these five kings and defeated them. Lot and his family were also abducted by Chedorlaomer. Lot thus put his trust in himself and not in God.

1. The days of Creation

Answer the following questions:



1. What does it mean when the Bible says that the earth was 'without form and void' or that it was 'completely uninhabitable'?

It means that the earth was a formless mass in the beginning. It was covered with water and in complete darkness. There were no plants, no animals and no human beings.

2. Was there always separation between land and water? Explain your answer.

No, there wasn't always separation. God separated land and water on the third day of creation. God let the waters gather at certain places and called it sea and the dry land that appeared He called earth.

3. Of what were the sun, moon and stars in the sky a sign?

From the fourth day on the sun, moon and stars were the carriers of light. These carriers of light determine the change between night and day. The position of these light carriers indicates the turn of years, seasons and days. They are also fixed signs to indicate position and direction to mankind.

4. Why did God create mankind in His own image? (Study Sunday 3, question 6 of the Belgic Confession)

God made man in His own image to enable man to know Him truly and in sanctity, to love Him with all his heart, to live with Him in eternal salvation and to praise and worship Him.

5. What was man's main task on earth?

Man's main task was to rule over the fish, the birds and the animals.

6. What kind of food did the different kinds of animals eat before the Fall of man?

All the animals ate green plants (vegetation).

1. Explain the position in which God placed man in creation.

God made man slightly less than a godly creature and crowned him with honour and glory. God also let man rule over His creation and everything (including the animals, the birds and the fish) had to submit to man.

2. Whom do we learn to know when we look at creation and what does this astonishing creation prove?

We learn to know God in His creation and therefore we can praise and glorify Him, because this wonderful creation is proof of His omnipotence and wisdom.

No, believers do not have a choice to decide for themselves, because it is God's instruction.

1. Are humans good by nature?

No, they are not good by nature. There is nobody that does well, not even one. The entire world is damnable before God (deserves punishment).

As a result of our sins we deserve God's wrath and judgment. The only just punishment for our sin against an eternal God, is death. "Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. This is the second death..." (Revelation 20: 14) That is why we need a Redeemer!

The word "subtil" means "Sly; artful; cunning; crafty; insinuating; as a subtil person; a subtil adversary." (https://av1611.com/kjbp/kjv-dictionary/subtil.html). The snake pretended to be devout and friendly, almost sincerely interested in the woman and her husband, but he actually wanted to deceive them into sin. The snake was used by the devil.

2. Why did Satan (by means of the snake) deceive the woman to be disobedient to God?

The devil used the snake as tool to tempt the woman into sin, because he had been an angel before, rebelling against God and God cast him out of heaven together with all his followers. He wanted to take revenge. If he could deceive the woman through the snake, he could then use her to deceive her husband. Then he could conquer the head of God's creation and thus rule over the new creation.

3. Did only the woman (Eve) sin? Motivate.

No, her husband also received the forbidden fruit from her, he ate thereof and sinned in this way.

4. Why did the man and his woman make themselves clothes from fig leaves?

Their eyes opened and they realised that they were naked. They were ashamed and then used fig leaves to cover their nudity.

5. What does this fall mean to us and everybody else?

It means that all of us were born and received in sin.

6. Why did God drive Adam and Eve from the garden of Eden?

God wanted to keep them from eating from the tree of life. Should they eat from that tree they would remain living in the condition of misery and sin.

1. Is a baby born without sin?

No, the hereditary sin is an inherited defect with which all babies are infected in the womb and each and every one of us are born with it.

2. Against whom do we sin most deeply?

We sin most deeply against God.

Answer the following questions:

1. Why did God find Abel's offering acceptable, but not Cain's? (Hebrews 11: 4)

Abel offered in devoutness, because he was honest and grateful in his faith. Cain's attitude was not like Abel's.

2. What do the words mean that God said to Cain, "...but you must rule over it (sin)."(Genesis 4: 7)

Cain had to fight against sin and admit that he was wrong and jealous. He had to beg God for forgiveness. Should he have trusted God and asked for His help, he wouldn't have sinned any further. However, Cain did not do it.

3. What would happen to the person who would kill Cain, after he had killed his brother Abel? And what did God give Cain to prevent anyone from killing him? (Genesis 4: 15)

God said that if anybody should kill Cain, it would be avenged sevenfold. God put a mark on Cain to prevent Cain from being killed.

4. Describe what happened to Enoch (from the descendants of Seth). (Genesis 5:24)

Enoch had walked with God; and he was no more, because God took him. He did not die.

5. How do we know that Seth's descendants were not as unfaithful as Cain's?

We read about Enoch, one of Seth's descendants, who walked with God. Lamech, one of Cain's descendants trusted in his own power, he had more than one wife and was vindictive.

Read Ephesians 2: 1 – 10 discuss with your parents or guardian:

- 1. Is God merciful but also righteous?nd Yes, God is merciful/ gracious, but He is also righteous, therefore He demands in His righteousness that sins committed against the Most High majesty of God, should be heavily punished.
- 2. Are all people saved? Motivate.

No, the entire process of being saved is a process of mercy towards redemption. In Ephesians 2: 8 we read: "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God:"

6. The dove returns to Noah's Ark

Answer the following questions:

1. God regretted having created humans, because of their increasing sins, evil and violence. God decided to sweep the people He created, from the face of the earth. But Noah found mercy in the eyes of God. How did God grant Noah and his family mercy?

God informed Noah about His coming judgment and instructed Noah to build an Ark of gopher wood. Only Noah, his wife, their sons and wives, as well as pairs of every kind of animal and bird would be saved on this ark to survive the enormous flood.

2. How many animals entered the ark to survive the flood? (Genesis 7: 2 - 9).

Seven pairs of all clean animals, male and female. Of the unclean animals only one pair of each.

3. Why did Noah, after the rain, first send out birds? What did he want to find out?

He sent out birds to find out if there were any dry ground.

4. God let it rain for forty days and forty nights to destroy everything which He had created. For how long had the earth been inundated with water? (Genesis 7)

Water had inundated the earth for one hundred and fifty days.

5. What did Noah do after he and his family had left the Ark? (Genesis 8)

Noah built God an altar and sacrificed of all the clean animals and birds as burnt offerings.

Read Luke 17: 20 – 37 and discuss with your parents or guardian:

1. How did Jesus explain to His disciples the second coming of the kingdom of God would be and with which two events from ancient times did He compare the second coming?

Jesus explained that the kingdom of God would not come with visual signs. People will be living their normal lives and then the Son of God would suddenly appear. Jesus compared the second coming with the days of Noah right before the flood and with the days of Lot right before the destruction of Sodom. Man approached the coming judgment without realising it, because they ignored the warning to repent their sins.

Study: Genesis 6: 18 "But with thee will I establish my covenant; and thou shalt come into the ark, thou, and thy sons, and thy wife, and thy sons' wives with thee."

7. The tower of Babel

Answer the following questions

1. What is a covenant?

A covenant is an establishment between God and man. All covenants have a demand and a promise. The demand of all covenants is complete obedience to God Almighty. The promise is eternal life.

2. What was the sign and natural covenant that God had given Noah and what did it mean?

The rainbow in the clouds was the sign of the covenant established by God with Noah. The promise was that God would never again destroy the earth with water and the seasons from then on would turn. God only demanded obedience from man and He demands obedience from us too.

3. Why did the people build The tower of Babel?

They wanted to pride themselves by building a city and a tower of which the summit would reach heaven to keep them from being spread all over the earth.

4. Why did God reject their plans to build a city and a tower?

God was angry because they had decided to stick together and that was against His command. The building of the city and the tower was only the beginning of their enterprise; God realised that nothing would be impossible to them anymore. He had to intervene and upset their plans.

5. How did God upset their plans to keep them from completing the city and the tower?

He confused their language so that they could no longer understand one another. In that way He forced them to move away from one another and spread all over the earth. The result was separate nations, each with their own language.

Read Acts 2: 1 – 7 and Matthew 28: 18 – 20 and discuss with your parents or guardian:

1. Do you think it is necessary to translate the Bible into all languages? Explain.

Yes, it definitely is, because with the descending of the Holy Spirit and its pouring out, the disciples could suddenly speak and prophesy in other languages. This led religious Jews from different nations to receive the message of God's great deeds in their own languages. Jesus's missionary instruction is also very clear: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:" (Matthew 28: 19) God gave mankind different languages and He wants each and every one to receive the Bible in his own language.





He cut the animals in half and laid each half opposite each other, but he did not cut the birds in half. That was the way in which people established a covenant with one another in those days.

3. Who kindled the fire that went through the pieces of meat?

God kindled the fire.

4. Who was the Angel and what did He tell Hagar about her descendants?

The Angel of God was more than an ordinary angel. He spoke as God Himself, 'I will greatly multiply your descendants so that they cannot be counted for multitude.'

5. Why did Sarai treat Hagar so badly that she fled from her?

Sarai treated Hagar badly, because Hagar looked with contempt on her after she became pregnant. Sarai then complained and told Abram what she had done and Abram gave Sarai permission to do whatever she liked with Hagar.

Read John 14, Titus 2 and discuss with your parents or guardian:

1. Why do we have to do good deeds?

We have to do good deeds, because Christ renewed us in His image through the Holy Spirit after He purchased us with His blood. We can now show our gratitude with our lives for His kind action and laud Him. We also do good deeds to reap the fruits of our religious certainty and through our God fearing lives we also bring others to Christ.

2. Can good deeds take you to heaven?

No, good deeds can't take you to heaven, only Jesus can, because He is the only way to Salvation, for He was the only one who could pay for our sins. Jesus said in John 14: 6, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me."

The faithful and believing person whose sins have been forgiven, is still naturally inclined to sin. That is the sin of the flesh. Through the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ the believer is recreated in Christ's likeness and thus we are better in Christ, but not of ourselves.

2. Do we do good deeds to contribute to our own salvation?

No, we are redeemed from our misery through the grace of God, not through our own good deeds.

3. Why is it important to the faithful to do good deeds?

Our good deeds are the fruit, the result of Christ and the Holy Spirit's work of salvation. With our good deeds we thank and praise God. Our good deeds strengthen our faith and we bring our neighbour to God.

Abimelech sent for Sarah to become his wife.

3. Why did Abraham only tell a half-truth about Sarah?

Abraham said that Sarah was his sister although she had only been his half-sister. The truth was that Sarah had been his wife but he kept silent about that fact. This meant that the king wanted to take her as his wife, because he thought that she did not have a husband. Abraham's silence contributed to this wrong impression. She was married and Abraham's wife!

4. What did Ishmael do on the day that little Isaac was weaned? (It made Sarah so angry that she insisted Abraham should chase him and his mother away.)

Ishmael mocked little Isaac.

5. Why did Hagar put Ishmael under one of the bushes and went to sit a good way off and cried?

Hagar sat away from Ishmael and cried because she did not want to see her child die.

We deserve, according to the righteous judgment of God, eternal penance for our sins. 3. How did God make it possible for us to overcome the punishment for sins?







1. In which two ways do we learn to know God?

Firstly we learn to know God through The days of Creation. The days of Creation is indeed before us like a book in which all creatures, big and small are like letters which we then use to see and read clearly the invisible traits of God, namely His eternal power and godliness. Secondly God exposes Himself to us clearer and more perfect through His Word (the Bible). God's Word comprises the truth (John 17: 17). In other words, we have everything we need to know Him.

2. Can a person who does not own a Bible, excuse himself from not knowing God, as a result thereof? (Romans 1: 20 – 21). Explain your answer.

No, Paul says that since The days of Creation, mankind has seen the power and godliness of God clearly and understands that He is truly God. For these people there is absolutely no excuse that, although they had known God, they never thanked or glorified Him. They have become evil in their judgments and their foolish hearts are darkened.

Jesus also confirmed that Satan was the 'original snake' (Revelation 12: 9) There is no truth in Satan because his entire way of working is completely based on lies and deceit. It is in his nature to tell lies. "When he lies, he speaks out of his own character..." (John 8: 44)

2. Is the devil to be blamed for everything that goes wrong in your life?

No, because the first humans deliberately listened to the devil and through that sinned and subjected themselves and their descendants to death and the curse. (Genesis 3) Our entire nature is therefore sinful, wicked, wrong and rotten. We are responsible for our own misery. Satan indeed played a part in the Fall of man, but that does not exempt man from his guilt. Adam and Eve could have said 'no' and we can also say 'no' to sins, but we don't always do it. Consequently we are responsible for the result and the penance of our sins. Jesus Christ, however, was without any sins, but God used Him for our sake instead, to carry our sins so that we could be redeemed through Jesus Christ. (2 Corinthians 5: 21)

God, however, sometimes allow Satan to cause for instance, suffering and illness. (Job 1: 12) We also know that "...the whole world lies in the power of the evil one." (1 John 5: 19) Satan is full of hatred, fraud and cruelty and that is why the world, under his influence, is also full of it.

2. Are all faiths acceptable to God? Motivate your answer.



1 Could there be a human somewhere without sin who could pay for our sins?

No, there's nobody without sins, because when Adam and Eve had sinned in the Garden of Eden their descendants became sinners. Children are therefore born with a sinful nature and that causes the entire mankind to be sinful! There is nobody who is naturally righteous and sensible enough. The whole world deserves God's judgment. Everybody, without exception, has sinned.

2. If all people are indeed sinful, how are our sins paid for?

We needed a ransom to redeem us from the wages of sin namely death which we inherited from Adam. (Romans 5: 12 and 6: 23). The death of Jesus Christ, the onlybegotten Son of God had great value because He had died without sins. God could accept the value of the perfect life of Jesus as ransom for the obedient descendants of the sinful Adam. And the value of Jesus' sacrifice extends further than only paying for our previous sins. If not, we would not have had any future. Seeing that we have been received in sin, we shall definitely sin again. (Psalm 51: 7) How grateful can we be that Jesus' death gives us the opportunity to receive perfection which God initially meant for us to have!
